1 Read the passage and answer the questions:

When Porus was taken prisoner, Alexander asked him how he wished to be treated. 'As a king,' Porus answered, and when Alexander went on to ask whether he had anything more to say, the reply came, 'Those words, "as a king" include everything.' At any rate Alexander not only allowed him to govern his former kingdom, but he also added to it a province, which included the territory of the independent peoples he had subdued. These are said to have numbered fifteen nations, five thousand towns of considerable size, and innumerable villages. His other conquests embraced an area three times the size of this, and he appointed Philip, one of the Companions, to rule it as satrap.

CALONICE:	Don't worry, darling, they'll come. It's not so easy for a wife to get out of the house, you know. They'll all be hanging round their husbands, waking up the servants, putting the baby to sleep or washing and feeding it –	
LYSISTRATA:	But dammit, there are more important things than that!	10
CALONICE:	Tell me, Lysistrata dear, what is this thing that you've called us women together to talk about? Is it a big thing?	
LYSISTRATA:	A very big thing.	
CALONICE:	Big and meaty, you mean?	
LYSISTRATA:	Very big and very meaty.	15
CALONICE:	Then why on earth aren't they here?	
LYSISTRATA:	That's not what I meant – otherwise they certainly <i>would</i> have arrived promptly! No, it's an idea that I've been thinking over and tossing about through many sleepless nights.	
CALONICE:	Something pretty flimsy, then, surely, if it's so easy to toss about?	20


